







GB Mesothelioma Cases



I The annual number of mesothelioma deaths has increased from 153 in 1968 to 2056 in 2006. Previous projections suggest that they will peak somewhere between current levels and 2450 deaths some time before 2015. Work is underway to provide more up-to-date estimates.

Deaths occurring now reflect industrial conditions of the past. Male deaths under 55 have been falling since the mid-1990s.



Are claims on increase?

RTAs injuries are on decrease; asbestos claims are increasing

Claims cost more!!

In 2007 Insurers paid out:

£6.2m per day in liability claims.

£17.1m per day in private motor claims.






What are claims?

- Civil claim for damages Sheriff Court or Court of Session.
- Criminal prosecution Sheriff Court or High Court.
- FAI or Public Inquiry (not a claim, but a cost).
- Accident could result in <u>ALL</u> 3 of these.





- Make Health and Safety a top priority.
 - IOD Guidance
 - 4 action points



BIGGART BAIL



- Plan
 - set out policy.
- Deliver
 - RAs; MS; train; adequately resource; competent H&S officer/consultant; "visibility"; suppliers/partners committed to health & safety.
- Monitor
 - reporting; audit of staff and contractors; sickness – underlying cause?
- Review
 - annual formal board room review;
 - keep up to date / ahead of best practice. 🚟



Occupational Road Risk

"It is anomalous that the vast majority of workrelated deaths are not examined by the Health and Safety Executive, purely because they occur on the roads. The Government should review the role of the Health and Safety Executive with regard to road safety to ensure that it fulfils its unique role in the strategy beyond 2010."

EVIDENCE, EVIDENCE, EVIDENCE!

Accident reports; risk assessments; method statements; witness details.





- Serious incident immediately build a team:
 - Solicitors
 - Experts
 - Internal investigation report

Remember, written documents are recoverable; all communications to be vetted by solicitor.





- Insurance now and in the future.
- What are your company's risks? Are you covered?
- Deductibles?
- Long term claims (asbestos, VWF).
- Companies you have bought insurance risks?
