68 RIDDOR Reports in last 2 years for unsafe gas installation caused by construction activity:-

Flues dislodged by scaffold erection and dismantling

Flues dislodged by external cladding workers

Flue terminals blocked by rough cast/mortar

Flue terminals sealed over during rough casting

Flues not sealed at external wall after being extended

Leading to products of combustion entering a property and risk of death from Carbon Monoxide poisoning

Gas Safety

Pre start meeting clients should proactively ask contractor how gas flue integrity will be maintained.

Clients should assist with access into properties to allow flues to be extended Contractor must have robust system in place to ensure flue extension work and cladding work are co-ordinated.

Gas safety should be a dedicated risk assessment/method statement
Site inductions should cover subject in depth – language issues!
Do cladding/roughcasters realise consequence of moving flue?
Flues should be sealed/fixed at external wall immediately after extending
The external cladding, roughcast and rendering work should be supervised

Flue terminals must be protected during casting but not sealed over











