Privilege



- Section 20(8) of the HASAWA 1974 cannot be compelled to hand over documents with legal professional privilege attaching
- □ Instruct a solicitor immediately to instruct/carry out investigation
- Appoint a core investigation team
- Privileged communications must remain between the team and the solicitor only
- □ Emails etc be careful
- Once privilege is gone it's gone....





Information gathering



- Get signed statements in the immediate aftermath as part of privileged investigation— covering more than just accident circumstances and aftermath
- Obtain all relevant documentation to support good H+S management within the company
- Don't wait for criminal/civil proceedings
- Lost/destroyed evidence may prejudice your efforts...

Non-fatal Injuries to workers according to self-reported estimates from the Labour Force Survey In 2017/18


Employee non-fatal Injuries reported by employers under RIDDOR In 2017/18

Working days lost due to non-fatal workplace injuries according to selfreported estimates from the Labour Force Survey In 2017/18


Estimated self-reported non-fatal injuries, 2017/18

There has been a longterm downward trend in the rate of fatal Injury to around 2012/13; more recently the rate has been broadly flat.

The rate of self-reported non-fatal Injury to workers showed a generally downward trend.

The rate of non-fatal Injury to employees reported by employers also showed a long-term downward frend.






Rate of self-reported work-related ill health and non-fatal injury by industry

Industries with III health rates statistically significantly higher than the rate for all industries were Agriculture, forestry and fishing, Human health and social work activities, Public administration and defence and Education.

Agriculture, forestry and fishing, Construction, Accommodation and food service activities, Wholesale and retail trade (including motor vehicle repair), Public administration and defence and Manufacturing had statistically significantly higher injury rates than for all industries.
