Fire Scotland Act 2005/Supporting Regulations 2006

• The Fire (Scotland) Act 2005 requires fire safety measures to be taken by the <u>duty holder</u> which, amongst other things, reduce the risk of fire spread and ensures that the means of escape from the relevant premises can be safely and effectively used at all times.

(Fire Doors)

- One way in which the above can be achieved is to carry out a routine inspection of all fire doors. This would examine the condition of the doors and then by making recommendations on whether they remain serviceable, require repairs, remedial works or replacement.
- Currently in Scotland the best practice guidance is that you check Fire doors every 6 months.



The Health and Safety at Work Act 1974 (HASAWA)

The HASAWA outlines the responsibilities that an employer has to their workers.

A safe system/way of performing work

A safe place to perform the work in

Safe equipment and machinery to perform the work

They must ensure work colleagues are competent in their roles

They must carry out the relevant risk assessment

Employers should be transparent and inform workers of any work-related risks

They should appoint a 'competent person' to oversee the health and safety

Employers must consult with workplace safety representatives and set up a workplace

safety committee if a union is recognised

Employers should provide adequate facilities for staff welfare



Fire Scotland Act 2005/Supporting Regulations 2006

Duty holder

You may have responsibilities for fire safety in your premises if you are -

- An employer
- The owner
- The landlord
- An occupier
- Anyone else with control of the premises, for example a facilities manager, building manager, managing agent or risk assessor



*Where the frame and leaf are produced by separate Q-Mark companies, both the frame and leaf must have their own red/green plug. The woodworking association BM TRADA uses a system known as Q-Mark, in which a series of coloured plugs is inserted into the door to indicate the fire door type, member details, the scope of certification during specification and installation, and service history.



What is a Fire Warden?

It is a legal requirement, for the responsible person to appoint one or more competent persons to assist them in undertaking preventative and protective measures to minimise the risk of fire.

A fire warden or fire marshal is a competent person who has been appointed to undertake these measures.



How fire risk is controlled in the workplace

Compartmentation **Escape routes** Fire warning alarms and fire detection systems **Emergency lighting** Fire fighting equipment Fixed firefighting installations & smoke control systems



Responsibilities of a Fire Warden (General)

- Ensuring the safety of employees in the event of a fire.
- Assist during a fire evacuation at a workplace.
- Ensure the safety of staff, visitors, and clients in the building during times of emergency.
- Help train other staff in evacuation procedures and how to use fire safety equipment.
- Assist with organising fire drills and evacuations.
- May have a responsibility for conducting frequent workplace checks/inspections.
- Investigate fire alarms Depending on premises use (UFAS)


P - Pull the Pin
